

With an unwavering commitment to anti-racism: welcome inclusively, engage meaningfully, partner authentically, build nimbly. evaluate effectively, & improve continually

Facilitate collaboration. co-design solutions, & reinforce accountability across levels & sectors, **share** knowledge, **advocate** in policy arenas, **build** capacity, **develop** systems, collect data. track & communicate progress, and **invest** in community driven programming that supports youth from cradle to career

# Disparities and inequities negatively affect the ability to fully thrive

- **Disparity** is a noticeable difference in treatment and outcomes
- **Inequity** is the state of being unfair or unjust

#### Current educational and economic conditions in Rice County, Minnesota

- Free and reduced-price school lunch qualification: 43%
- Cost burdened renter households: 45%
- High school graduation on-time rate: 79%
- Adults with high school diploma or less: 40.6%

# THEORY

Educational & economic opportunity are intertwined and fundamental to achieving health & racial equity

- Equity is freedom from bias
- Health equity is a fair and just opportunity to attain the highest level of good health
- Racial equity is the systematic fair treatment of people of all races
- Exploratory tool: RAND Corporation's "How the effects of bias compound"

# **KEY ACTIONS**

- Identify ways to shift conditions for those least advantaged
- Create a shared vision through facilitated partnerships & coalitions
- Collaborate & co-design solutions across levels and sectors
- Incorporate traditionally underrepresented voices into decision-making
- Support services that create relationships, alleviate current needs, and empower youth & their families

# IF/THEN

- If we facilitate collaboration and share knowledge across levels and sectors, then we can co-design solutions that can change systems, advance equity, and expand opportunity
- If we recruit and support diverse voices in decision-making, then advocacy in policy arenas is done authentically and across varying perspectives
- If we solicit resources and secure funding, then we can build capacity and support new activities
- If we develop systems, collect data, and track & communicate progress, then we can reinforce accountability and evaluate effectively
- If youth attain higher levels of education, then their potential for economic mobility increases
- If we fiscally invest in the infrastructure of community driven solutions, then we are positioned to create and maintain relationships with community residents that reduce isolation, foster kindergarten readiness, engage parents, widen access to mental health resources, connect neighbors, mentor & guide students, and offer affordable & relevant postsecondary options

- **Galvanize** collective action for transformational system changes that advance health & racial equity and expand educational & economic opportunity.

- **Invest** in complementary strategic programming that is community driven, responsive to current needs, and benefits those who are least advantaged.
