Prioritizing internet and food access

During the pandemic, HCI staff members adapted their work to address emerging needs. Connecting youth and families to the internet and to food became a major focus.

To ensure all students could connect to virtual school in 2020-21. HCl's **100% CONNECTED** program provided free hotspots and broadband internet access to **429** students from 222 Rice County families. Families were eligible if the




children received free/reduced school lunch, if they were clients of the Community Action Center, and/or if they faced economic hardship due




Across its initiatives, HCI staff and volunteers provided **102,842** direct contacts with youth and families during 2020 – ranging from academic advising to connecting families with resources

In the past 16 years, HCI has helped bring in nearly **\$18 million** in grants from outside Rice County to benefit local children and youth



CLOSING GRADUATION GAPS

In the past year, TORCH (Northfield) and RISE (Faribault) helped more than 500 students succeed in school, explore careers, and pursue post-secondary opportunities. These are students in grades 6-12 who come from low-income families, are students of color, and/or will be first-generation college attendees.

The Northfield Community College Collaborative

(NCCC) moved into a larger space at the Northfield Community Resource Center in fall 2020 to accommodate its growing numbers. Since it launched in 2018, the NCCC has:


- offered 30 in-person Riverland Community College classes in Northfield
- supported students enrolled in more than **300** online classes
- provided holistic advising to more than 100 students

Collectively, its students have earned more than 1600 college credits.
